Chicago Organizations Focused on Queer Youth Homelessness

Howard Brown/Broadway Youth Center [http://howardbrown.org/byc/]

History:

- Howard Brown founded in 1974 in response to need for culturally competent STI testing and treatment for queer men
- Emergence of AIDS epidemic in 1980s drove expansion into culturally competent general medical care for queer men
- 1990s expansion into specific needs of of gueer women
- Opening of BYC in 2004 reflects another expansion of mission to provide all sexual minorities in need of culturally competent care

BYC services

- "Today, more than twelve community partners and agencies collaborate to provide primary medical care, HIV and STI testing and counseling, confidential family planning, counseling, support groups, case management, housing assistance programs, GED educational and vocational training, and drop-in needs and services such as showers, laundry, and food to youth and young adults throughout Chicago and surrounding suburbs." [http://howardbrown.org/about/mission-and-overview/]
- Criticism of BYC has centered on its location in a white, affluent neighborhood that is unfriendly to the POC youth it serves and remote from their neighborhoods

Funding [all information from 2014 annual report]

- Patient revenue 3.3 million
- Government contracts 4.3 million
- donations/"direct public support": 4.8 million
- 340B pharmacy revenue: 23.4 million [federal program that enables HBHC to purchase prescription drugs at a discount]
- Youth program expenses: \$923, 067 4% of expenses (85% of HBHC expenses are medical)

History

- Founded March 2011 with purpose to provide "identity-affirming housing to homeless LGBTQ youth, some being HIV positive, and to provide support services to assist with their transition to independence." [http://elrescatechicago.org/]
- Building opened in March 2012

- February 2014 - 19 of 25 places filled [http://chicagoreporter.com/tcr-talks-jackie-gonzalez-helps-homeless-youth-if-they-were-her-own/#.Uvk4k3zwKf9]

Services:

- Transitional housing for LGBTQ Latinx youth, some who are living with HIV
- A program of Vida/SIDA, the HIV outreach program of the Puerto Rican Cultural Center [http://www.prcc-chgo.org/initiatives/vidasida/]

Funding:

- Funding appears to be primarily via the Puerto Rican Cultural Center, but also some direct fundraising
- donations/direct public support

- Purchased building on southwest side in August 2015
- Planned opening August 2016

Services:

- transitional housing and support services for LGBT youth

- volunteer labor
